I refer to your email of 5 February 2023 to the Honourable Annastacia Palaszczuk MP, Premier and Minister for the Olympic and Paralympic Games, about the Brisbane International Cruise Terminal (BICT). Your correspondence was referred to the Honourable Mark Bailey MP, Minister for Transport and Main Roads, for consideration and response. The Minister has asked that I respond on his behalf.

I note the concerns you have raised. The Department of Transport and Main Roads has sought a response to the matters from the owner of the BICT, Port of Brisbane Pty Ltd (PBPL).

PBPL has advised, that as the terminal caters for an influx of visitors on days when cruise ships are in port, the BICT has a number of different seating areas including a ground floor air-conditioned lounge area with seating for 150 people, along with multiple undercover outdoor seating areas in the breezeway area. There are also seating areas at the check-in lounge area located on the first floor.

PBPL has noted your concern around the unavailability of refreshments and advised a coffee shop is being commissioned on site this year, while in the interim a coffee cart has been organised to attend most cruise ship calls.

PBPL confirmed the BICT is designed and fully compliant for all mobility requirements with internal travelators and lifts inside the terminal building. Also, two electric mobility vehicles are available for cruise line staff to use to aid passengers to the elevated walkway.

PBPL has further advised that on cruise ship days the respective cruise lines are licensed to generally control the space within the terminal and use of the mobility vehicles.

PBPL has suggested it may be beneficial for passengers to contact their cruise operator about any concerns or requirements with the view to improving the customer experience.



My only negative observation is the journey from the location of the former terminal at Hamilton to the new terminal at Luggage Point. Not only are these two sites cheese and chalk but the districts between them are marked by unsightly, dirty heavy industries, over grown empty lots and dilapidation, abandoned houses with broken windows, sites with rusting containers and grotty piles of scrap, dusty, well-worn pot holed roads driven over by intimidating, weightily laden trucks servicing the area and finally, the very unappealing sight of the sewerage farm. This image was the subject of much derisive comment by many of the passengers as the visit to the Brisbane Terminal was sandwiched between the Sydney Cruise Terminal and the Cairns Cruise Terminal. Both of which have flawless, beautiful, locations. I appreciate that this industrial area is a working zone and that it was established where it is with access to the port, airport and M1 Highway for good economic and historic reasons, long before a cruise terminal was conceived. I am a realist and don't propose changing the status quo but I believe that everything can be improved. I have searched on-line for a masterplan of the port and this area without success, consequently, if it hasn't already been considered I suggest judicious plantings and an alternate route to the cruise terminal be developed similar to the slick and well-groomed road to the airport. I know you will be receptive once you take 30 minutes of your time to travel this route and see the shabbiness for yourself. In any event I will be pleased to learn what you decide to do to stop the grungy picture described from becoming the lasting impression for maritime visitors to Brisbane and South East Queensland. 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

A member of the public wrote to the Premier expressing concerns about the lack of amenities for passengers at the BICT and this correspondence has been forwarded to TMR for response.

### The concerns raised are:

1. Need for places to sit, eat or have a coffee while waiting at the new Terminal BICT has a ground floor air conditioned lounge area with seating for 150 people, along with multiple

- undercover outdoor seating areas in the breezeway area. There are also seating areas at the check-in lounge area located on the first floor. A coffee shop is being commissioned on site this year, and in the interim a coffee cart attends most cruise ship calls. Use of the terminal spaces is under the control of the cruise operators under a licence from Port of Brisbane.
- 2. Need for a Travelator (or similar facility) to aid mobility impaired passengers access to the cruise ship (instead of long walkway) BICT is designed and fully compliant for all mobility requirements with internal travelators and lifts inside the terminal building. We have also provided two electric mobility vehicles for Cruise line staff to use to aid passengers to get to the ship on the elevated walkway. The Cruise lines have control of the terminal and these vehicles, under a licence from Port of Brisbane, and therefore have use of the vehicles at their discretion.

Would you please advise PBPL's response to these matters so that we may prepare the reply.

Your advice by COB Thursday, 16 February 2023 would be much appreciated.



Since receiving your letter, I have made independent enquiries to assess the incidents and risk events you have detailed in your letter. As a result, PSP has provided feedback to Maritime Safety Queensland (MSQ), and corrective actions have been initiated.

In addition, detailed discussions have taken place with PSP regarding MSQ's expectations concerning the safety of Pilotage operations, including timely, effective reporting of incidents and risk events, fatigue management and closed loop resolution processes. This matter has also resulted in a detailed discussion between myself and the CEO of Australian Maritime Systems (AMSG) (the parent company of PSP).

One extra item in your letter was a concern relating to overall Pilot numbers for PSP. You may now be aware that PSP has increased its number of licensed pilots with several ex-Brisbane Marine Pilots, which has provided a greater level of robustness to PSP's operations.

I thank you for bringing these matters to our attention and be assured that MSQ is closely monitoring PSP's performance to ensure promised outcomes are delivered to the standards required.

- has contacted Mr Jason Hunt MP, Member for Calouridra via his Electorate Office on several occasions.
- raises her concerns regarding the new pilotage service provider for the Brisbane Pilotage Area, specifically about lost employment opportunities, training, alleged pilotage incidents, alleged breaches of the International Maritime Organisation (IMO) standards for pilotage training, and suspicion of collusion between a government entity and a private company.

#### Suggestion of Collusion

- The pilotage service in the Port of Brisbane has been provided by Brisbane Marine Pilots Pty Ltd (BMP) since 1989, through various contracts.
- The tender process was the result of years of planning commencing early in 2017, with government approval given to conduct an open tender in November 2019.
- An open tender for the provision of port pilotage services for the Brisbane Pilotage
  Area was conducted in 2020 with industry being alerted to the upcoming tender via the
  forward procurement pipeline in December 2019.
- Following a rigorous evaluation process overseen by a probity advisor, an agreement was entered into with a new supplier, Poseidon Sea Pilots (PSP) in January 2021.
- suggests that as the General Manager, Maritime Safety Queensland (MSQ) has stated publicly that MSQ has worked towards enabling the new pilotage provider for two years raises suspicion of collusion and this indicates the tender process was a sham.
- MSQ commenced the transition process with the new provider only after the agreement for pilotage services had been entered into on 8 January 2021.
- It may have been unclear in messaging about the pilotage services agreement that the General Manager was referring to the two year (plus) tender process, not the 12-month transition process to a new provider.

#### Pilotage Incidents and Near Misses

- states that PSP has had one collision and 7 reportable near misses in the first 15 days of delivery of pilotage services.
- MSQ monitors all pilotage risk events and provides feedback to service providers on opportunities for improvement.
- Risk events regularly occur across the 21 regulated ports. MSQ encourages a noblame culture of reporting by providers and considers self-reporting as a positive part of pilotage safety as it generates continual improvement across all ports in Queensland.
- PSP commenced service delivery under the new contract as scheduled on 1 January 2022. It has safely and efficiently completed over 700 piloted movements in its two months during which shipping operations were impacted by the wind and tidal effects of TC Seth, the Tsunami affecting areas of the south-western pacific and most recently the floods in Brisbane and surrounding regions.
- Like all pilotage providers, PSP is actively encouraged to report pilotage risk events and these provide an opportunity for improvements in delivery. PSP and the Regional Harbour Master, MSQ meet on a weekly basis to review reported events.
- The "collision" referred to may be minor damage to Fisherman Island No 1 wharf (minor concrete chips) and ship (MV Glorious Ace – minor paint scratch) which occurred on 13 January 2022.
- This incident was reported by PSP to MSQ and was investigated in accordance with the MSQ policy and procedures and separately by AMSA. The incident took place after the pilotage movement had been completed and the vessel berthed. The damage occurred when the vessel was subsequently being repositioned further along the wharf and was not due to pilotage error.

#### Training and IMO and AMPI responses

- The tender specifications and contract include the current training and licensing requirements. No change has been made or was agreed to be made to these requirements prior to service commencement under the new agreement.
- Pilots recruited by PSP are largely experienced pilots from other Australian Ports.
   These pilots have provided pilotage services to the same ships and ship Masters visiting ships in ports in Melbourne, Sydney and Gladstone.
- MSQ believes the current training and licensing requirements comply fully with IMO Resolution A960, Annex 1.
- states that as of 16 January 2022 you had not responded to letters from the Australasian Marine Pilots Institute (AMPI) and the International Marine Pilots Association (IMPA). Your response to IMPA was made on 12 January 2022 (Refer to MC122284).
- Direct correspondence from AMPI regarding this matter has not been received. AMPI did however publish an open letter to the shipping and pilotage industry (MBN24914).

#### **Employment**

All pilots employed by BMP were offered opportunities with the new provider. None
joined the PSP before the new contract service started on 1 January 2022.

 Some of the pilot vessel transfer crew and dispatch officers employed by BMP joined the new provider.

Further to my previous emails, I wish to update you on the current changes to the provision of Marine Pilotage services in Brisbane.

Brisbane Marine Pilots has now ceased to operate, resulting in the loss of approximately 70 local employees and pilots, effectively sidelining 500 years of collective pilotage knowledge and experience.

Poseidon Sea Pilots commenced operations on January 1, 2022 and in the subsequent 15 days has had 1 collision and 7 reportable near misses. A Poseidon pilot, during an interview with Seven News, stated that his 3 month training period was sufficient to acquaint him with the pilotage area. Previously, a pilot with experience required 18 months to be granted their licence in the port of Brisbane and a new pilot to Brisbane Marine Pilots required 3 years of progressive training to obtain their full licence. The disparity is obvious, alarming and prophetic.

Maritime Safety Queensland has directly breached the IMO standards for pilotage training. The general manager of MSQ has stated publicly that they have been working towards enabling the new pilotage provider for 2 years despite the tender for these services being awarded only 1 year ago, raising strong suspicion of collusion between a government entity and a private company, and indicating that the tender process was a sham.

There has been NO response from Minister Bailey to the International Marine Pilots Association and the Australasian Marine Pilots institute. I can only assume that you also received NO response as you assured me that you would inform me when you had received answers to the questions posed.

Imagine the damage to the environment in your electorate if there is a grounding and oil spillage in Pumicestone Passage or damage to port infrastructure (as has already occurred) in Brisbane, resulting in further impacts on brittle supply chains.

I would not be surprised by this situation if I was living in a 'banana republic'. I am astounded that this has occurred in Australia and, in particular, in a LABOR state.

New Award has a displacement of at least 100,000 tonnes carrying oil. MSQ records should show that all resources available to control New Award were at maximum trying to regain control of this situation.

Are you able to assist with responding to his concerns or would another minister's office be better suited to assist?

Hello, I am a Wynnum resident.

- 2. The Expansion of the Port of Brisbane is a concern. Both environmentally and commercially. There is a huge demand for container facilities and developers are replacing existing general industry lots with container hardstands. Jobs are being lost in industrial areas as coontainer storage takes the place of general industry. I work in a shipyard and am worried our facility will be sold to a developer who changes the zoning and we become a car park for containers. 350 people work on site here each day. It would be a great shame to lose this facility and our reduce capacity in our industry.
- 3. The Expansion of the Port into the Bay is a concern. The Bay is a hugely sensitive ecosystem and habitat. If we allow the port to continue its expansion out into the bay then we are no different to the Chinese. As a fifth generation Moreton Bay Boatie I can see the damage this port expansion is causing. Dead fish, Dead turtles, Dead Dugongs, Excessive Siltation of sea grass beds are visible to those who use the bay for pleasure.

# RECOMMENDATIONS ON TRAINING AND CERTIFICATION AND ON OPERATIONAL PROCEDURES FOR MARITIME PILOTS OTHER THAN DEEP-SEA PILOTS

THE ASSEMBLY,

RECALLING Article 15(j) of the Convention on the International Maritime Organization concerning the functions of the Assembly in relation to regulations and guidelines concerning maritime safety and the prevention and control of marine pollution from ships,

RECOGNIZING that maritime pilots play an important role in promoting maritime safety and protecting the marine environment.

BELIEVING that maintaining a proper working relationship between the pilot, the master and, as appropriate, the officer in charge of a navigational watch is important in ensuring the safety of shipping,

NOTING that, since each pilotage area needs highly specialized experience and local knowledge on the part of the pilot, IMO does not intend to become involved with either the certification or the licensing of pilots or with the systems of pilotage practised in various States,

RECOGNIZING ALSO the high standards of pilotage services already established in many States and the need for these standards to be maintained,

CONSIDERING that in those States that are developing pilotage services, the establishment of practical minimum training standards, certification requirements and operational procedures to provide effective co-ordination between pilots and ship personnel, taking due account of sinp bridge procedures and ship equipment, would contribute to maritime safety,

HAVING CONSIDERED the recommendation made by the Maritime Safety Committee at its seventy-fifth session,

For reasons of economy, this document is printed in a limited number. Delegates are kindly asked to bring their copies to meetings and not to request additional copies.

- 1. ADOPTS:
  - (a) the Recommendation on Training and Certification of Maritime Pilots other than Deep-sea Pilots set out in Annex 1 to the present resolution;
  - (b) the Recommendation on Operational Procedures for Maritime Pilots other than Deep-sea Pilots set out in Annex 2 to the present resolution;
- 2. URGES Governments to give effect to these Recommendations as soon as possible;
- 3. REQUESTS the Maritime Safety Committee to keep the Recommendations under review and to amend them as necessary in the light of experience gained from their implementation;
- 4. REVOKES resolution A.485(XII).

#### ANNEX 1

# RECOMMENDATION ON TRAINING AND CERTIFICATION OF MARITIME PILOTS OTHER THAN DEEP-SEA PILOTS

### 1 Scope

- 1.1 It is recognised that pilotage requires specialised knowledge and experience of a specific area and that States with many diverse waterways and ports have found it appropriate to administer pilotage on a regional or local basis.
- 1.2 The maritime pilots referred to in this Recommendation do not include deep-sea pilots or shipmasters or crew who are certificated or licensed to carry out pilotage duties in particular areas.
- 1.3 Governments should encourage the establishment or maintenance of competent pilotage authorities to administer safe and efficient pilotage systems.

# 2 Competent pilotage authority

- 2.1 Competent pilotage authority means either the national or regional Governments or local groups or organizations that by law or tradition, administer or provide a pilotage system. Governments should inform competent pilotage authorities of the provisions of this document and encourage their implementation.
- 2.2 The assessment of the experience, qualifications and suitability of an applicant for certification or licensing, as a pilot, is the responsibility of each competent pilotage authority.
- 2.3 The competent pilotage authority in co-operation with the national and local pilots' associations should:
  - .1 establish the entry requirements and develop the standards for obtaining a certificate or licence in order to perform pilotage services within the area under its jurisdiction;
  - .2 enforce the maintenance of developed standards;
  - .3 specify whatever prerequisites, experience or examinations are necessary to ensure that applicants for certification or licensing as pilots are properly trained and qualified; and
  - .4 arrange that reports on investigations of incidents involving pilotage are taken into account in maritime pilots' training programmes.

#### 3 Pilotage certificate or licence

Every pilot should hold an appropriate pilotage certificate or licence issued by the competent pilotage authority. In addition to stating the pilotage area for which it is issued, the certificate or licence should also state any requirements or local limitations that the competent pilotage authority may specify such as maximum size, draught or tonnage of vessels that the holder is qualified to pilot.

#### 4 Medical fitness

- 4.1 Each pilot should satisfy the competent pilotage authority that his or her medical fitness, particularly regarding eyesight, hearing and physical fitness meets the standards required for certification of masters and officers in charge of a navigational watch under the international Convention on Standards of Training, Certification and Watchkeeping for Seafarers, 1978, as amended, or such other standards as the competent pilotage authority considers appropriate.
- 4.2 If a pilot has experienced a serious injury or illness, there should be a re-evaluation of his or her medical fitness prior to return to duty.

## 5 Training and certification or licensing standards

- 5.1 The competent pilotage authority is responsible for training and certification or licensing standards. The standards should be sufficient to enable pilots to carry out their duties safely and efficiently.
- 5.2 Standards for initial training should be designed to develop in the trainee pilot the skills and knowledge determined by the competent pilotage authority to be necessary for obtaining a pilot certificate or license. The training should include practical experience gained under the close supervision of experienced pilots. This practical experience gained on vessels under actual piloting conditions may be supplemented by simulation, both computer and manned model, classroom instruction, or other training methods.
- 5.3 Every pilot should be trained in bridge resource management with an emphasis on the exchange of information that is essential to a safe transit. This training should include a requirement for the pilot to assess particular situations and to conduct an exchange of information with the master and/or officer in charge of navigational watch. Maintaining an effective working relationship between the pilot and the bridge team in both routine and emergency conditions should be covered in training. Emergency conditions should include loss of steering, loss of propulsion, and failures of radar, vital systems and automation, in a narrow channel or fairway.
- 5.4 Initial and continuing training in the master-pilot information exchange should also cover:
  - .1 regulatory requirements governing the exchange;
  - .2 recognition of language, cultural, psychological and physiological impediments to effective communication and interaction and techniques for overcoming these impediments; and
  - .3 best practices in the specific pilotage area.
- 5.5 Competent pilotage authorities should be encouraged to provide updating and refresher training conducted for certified or licensed pilots to ensure the continuation of their proficiency and updating of their knowledge, and could include the following;
  - .! courses to improve proficiency in the English language where necessary;
  - .2 sessions to enhance the ability to communicate with local authorities and other vessels in the area;

- .3 meetings with local authorities and other responsible agencies to envisage emergency situations and contingency plans;
- .4 refresher or renewal courses in bridge resource management for pilots to facilitate communication and information exchange between the pilot and the master and to increase efficiency on the bridge.
- .5 simulation exercises, which may include radar training and emergency shiphandling procedures;
- .6 courses in shiphandling training centres using manned models;
- .7 seminars on new bridge equipment with special regard to navigation aids;
- .8 sessions to discuss relevant issues connected with the pilotage service including laws, rules and regulations particular to the pilotage area;
- .9 personal safety training;
- .10 techniques for personal survival at sea; and
- .11 emergency first aid, including cardio-pulmonary resuscitation (CPR) and hypothermia remediation.

# 6 Continued proficiency

- 6.1 In order to ensure the continued proficiency of pilots and updating of their knowledge, the competent pilotage authority should satisfy itself, at regular intervals not exceeding five years, that all pilots under its jurisdiction:
  - .1 continue to possess recent navigational knowledge of the local area to which the certificate of licence applies;
  - .2 continue to meet the medical fitness standards of paragraph 4 above; and
  - .3 possess knowledge of the current international, national and local laws, regulations and other requirements and provisions relevant to the pilotage area and the pilots' duties.
- 6.2 Possession of knowledge required by subparagraphs 6.1.1 and 6.1.3 may be proved by an appropriate method such as personal service records, completion of continuing professional development courses or by an examination.
- 6.3 Where a pilot in cases of absence from duty, for whatever reason, is lacking recent experience in the pilotage area, the competent pilotage authority should satisfy itself that the pilot regains familiarity with the area on his or her return to duty.

# 7 Syllabus for pilotage certification or licensing

7.1 In the syllabus, area means the waters for which the applicant is to be certified or licensed. Each applicant for a pilot certificate or license should demonstrate that he or she has necessary knowledge of the following:

- .1 limits of local pilotage areas;
- .2 International Regulations for Preventing Collisions at Sea, 1972 as amended, and also such other national and local navigational safety and pollution prevention rules as may apply in the area;
- .3 system of buoyage in the area;
- .4 characteristics of the lights and their angles of visibility and the tog signals, racons and radio beacons and other electronic aids in use in the area;
- names, positions and characteristics of the light vessels, buoys, beacons, structures and other marks in the area;
- .6 names and characteristics of the channels, shoals, headlands and points in the area;
- .7 bridge and similar obstruction limitations including air draughts;
- .8 depths of water throughout the area, including tidal effects and similar factors;
- .9 general set, rate, rise and duration of the tides and use of the tide tables and real-time and current data systems, if available, for the area;
- .10 proper courses and distances in the area;
- .11 anchorages in the area;
- shiphandling for piloting, anchoring, berthing and unberthing, manoeuvring with and without tugs, and emergency situations;
- .13 communications and availability of navigational information;
- .14 systems of radio navigational warning broadcasts in the area and the type of information likely to be included;
- .15 traffic separation schemes, vessel traffic services and similar vessel management systems in the area;
- .16 bridge equipment and navigational aids;
- .17 use of radar and other electronic devices; their limitations and capabilities as navigation and collision avoidance aids;
- manoeuvring behaviour of the types of ships expected to be piloted and the limitations imposed by particular propulsion and steering systems;
- factors affecting ship performance such as wind, current, tide, channel configuration, water depth, bottom, bank and ship interaction including squat;
- .20 use and limitation of various types of tugs;

- .21 the English language to a standard adequate to enable the pilot to express communications clearly;
- .22 IMO Standard Marine Communication Phrases;
- .23 IMO Code for the investigation of marine casualties and incidents;
- .24 Master-Pilot Relationship, Pilot Card, operational procedures;
- .25 pollution prevention;
- .26 emergency and contingency plans for the area;
- .27 safe embarking and disembarking procedures; and
- .28 any other relevant knowledge considered necessary.

#### ANNEX 2

# RECOMMENDATION ON OPERATIONAL PROCEDURES FOR MARITIME PILOTS OTHER THAN DEEP-SEA PILOTS

#### 1 General

Efficient pilotage depends, among other things, upon the effectiveness of the communications and information exchanges between the pilot, the master and the bridge personnel and upon the mutual understanding each has for the functions and duties of the other. Establishment of effective co-ordination between the pilot, the master and the bridge personnel, taking due account of the ship's systems and equipment available to the pilot, will aid a safe and expeditious passage.

# 2 Duties of master, bridge officers and pilot

- 2.1 Despite the duties and obligations of a pilot, the pilot's presence on board does not relieve the master or officer in charge of the navigational watch from their duties and obligations for the safety of the ship. It is important that, upon the pilot boarding the ship and before the pilotage commences, the pilot, the master and the bridge personnel are aware of their respective roles in the safe passage of the ship.
- 2.2 The master, bridge officers and pilot share a responsibility for good communications and understanding of each other's role for the safe conduct of the vessel in pilotage waters.
- 2.3 Masters and bridge officers have a duty to support the pilot and to ensure that his/her actions are monitored at all times.

# 3 Pilot boarding point

- 3.1 The appropriate competent pilotage authority\* should establish and promulgate the location of safe pilot embarkation and disembarkation points.
- 3.2 The pilot boarding point should be at a sufficient distance from the commencement of the act of pilotage to allow safe boarding conditions.
- 3.3 The pilot boarding point should also be situated at a place allowing for sufficient time and sea room to meet the requirements of the master-pilot information exchange (see paragraphs 5.1 to 5.6).

### 4 Procedures for requesting pilot

- 4.1 The appropriate competent pilotage authority should establish, promulgate and maintain procedures for requesting a pilot for an inbound or outbound ship, or for shifting a ship.
- 4.2 As human resources and technical means have to be planned well in advance, the operation of an efficient pilotage service requires information on the Estimated Time of Arrival (ETA) or Departure (ETD) to be furnished by the ship as early as possible with frequent updates where possible.

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<sup>\* &</sup>quot;Competent pilotage authority" has the same meaning as in annex 1.

- 4.3 Communication by VHF or other dedicated means should be established as soon as possible to enable the master to confirm the ship's ETA and the Pilot Station to furnish relevant information regarding pilot boarding.
- 4.4 The initial ETA message to the Pilot Station should include all the information required by local regulations, including:
  - .1 ship's name, call sign, ship's agent;
  - .2 ship's characteristics: length, beam, draught, air draught it relevant, speed, thruster(s);
  - .3 date and time expected at the pilot boarding point;
  - .4 destination, berth (if required, side alongside); and
  - .5 other relevant requirements and information.

# 5 Master - pilot information exchange

- 5.1 The master and the pilot should exchange information regarding navigational procedures, local conditions and rules and the ship's characteristics. This information exchange should be a continuous process that generally continues for the duration of the pilotage.
- 5.2 Each pilotage assignment should begin with an information exchange between the pilot and the master. The amount and subject matter of the information to be exchanged should be determined by the specific navigation demands of the pilotage operation. Additional information can be exchanged as the operation proceeds.
- 5.3 Each competent pilotage authority should develop a standard exchange of information practice, taking into account regulatory requirements and best practices in the pilotage area. Pilots should consider using an information card, form, checklist or other memory aid to ensure that essential exchange items are covered. If an information card or standard form is used by pilots locally regarding the anticipated passage, the layout of such a card or form should be easy to understand. The card or form should supplement and assist, not substitute for, the verbal information exchange.
- 5.4 This exchange of information should include at least:
  - .1 presentation of a completed standard Pilot Card. In addition, information should be provided on rate of turn at different speeds, turning circles, stopping distances and, if available, other appropriate data;
  - .2 general agreement on plans and procedures, including contingency plans, for the anticipated passage;
  - .3 discussion of any special conditions such as weather, depth of water, tidal currents and marine traffic that may be expected during the passage;

- .4 discussion of any unusual ship-handling characteristics, machinery difficulties, navigational equipment problems or crew limitations that could affect the operation, handling or safe manoeuvring of the ship;
- information on berthing arrangements; use, characteristics and number of tugs; mooring boats and other external facilities;
- .6 information on mooring arrangements; and
- .7 confirmation of the language to be used on the bridge and with external parties.
- 5.5 It should be clearly understood that any passage plan is a basic indication of preferred intention and both the pilot and the master should be prepared to depart from it when circumstances so dictate.
- 5.6 Pilots and competent pilotage authorities should be aware of the voyage planning responsibilities of masters under applicable IMO instruments\*

# 6 Communications language

- 6.1 Pilots should be familiar with the IMO Standard Marine Communication Phrases and use them in appropriate situations during radiocommunications as well as during verbal exchanges on the bridge. This will enable the master and officer in charge of the navigational watch to better understand the communications and their intent.
- 6.2 Communications on board between the pilot and bridge watchkeeping personnel should be conducted in the English language or in a language other than English that is common to all those involved in the operation.
- 6.3 When a pilot is communicating to parties external to the ship, such as vessel traffic services, tugs or linesmen and the pilot is unable to communicate in the English language or a language that can be understood on the bridge, the pilot should, as soon as practicable, explain what was said to enable the bridge personnel to monitor any subsequent actions taken by those external parties.

## 7 Reporting of incidents and accidents

When performing pilotage duties, the pilot should report or cause to be reported to the appropriate authority, anything observed that may affect safety of navigation or pollution prevention. In particular, the pilot should report, as soon as practicable, any accident that may have occurred to the piloted ship and any irregularities with navigational lights, shapes and signals.

# 8 Refusal of pilotage services


The pilot should have the right to refuse pilotage when the ship to be piloted poses a danger to the safety of navigation or to the environment. Any such refusal, together with the reason, should be immediately reported to the appropriate authority for action as appropriate.

# 9 Fitness for duty

Pilots should be adequately rested and mentally alert in order to provide undivided attention to pilotage duties for the duration of the passage.

#### Port of Brisbane - Simulation in lieu of on-water training

Dear Mr Mahon,

I am writing to reiterate the strong concerns of AMPI (as a member of IMPA) and the wider pilotage fraternity regarding the deepening crisis in Brisbane.

I have attended the Marine Safety Queensland stakeholder engagement meetings, alongside the AMPI executive and many of our members. AMPI is not satisfied that our concerns have been addressed in a meaningful way, and in many cases, we found the answers to our questions to be evasive and lacking in substance.

I would also like to refute the statement from Jim Huggett that MSQ and AMPI were in "lockstep" over the issue (industry engagement 6th December 2021), this is incorrect.

You have informed us that Poseidon Sea Plicts are training marine pilots for a pilotage license without on-water training and are being licensed by MSQ based on their previous experience in other ports, augmented by simulation. We do not consider this approach to have parity with the existing training program for the Port of Brisbane, or any other major port in Queensland.

These training arrangements do not comply with IMO Res A960, Annex 1 (copy attached for reference), specifically paragraph 5 which deals with training and certification or licensing standards.

These training arrangements (ail short of any other port in Australia and likely any other major port in the western world.

Marine Safety Queensland appear to be of the understanding that simulation can effectively replace on-water training, AMF1 asserts that this is not the case. The International Maritime Organisation and International Marine Pilots Association share our position regarding the use of simulation. IMO A960 (M) (2004 Version) Section 5.2 states that the practical experience gained by the trainee pilot "may be supplemented by simulation, both computer and manned model ..." and two IMPA Resolutions on the use of shiphandling simulators resolved that "... the use of simulators to evaluate or predict a pilot's performance in the real world for licensing purposes to be an inappropriate use of an otherwise valuable technology" as well as resolving that ... "the sole use of simulators for training and certification to be inadequate in validating the appropriate levels of competence required for navigating in pilotage waters ..."

The argument that the Smartship simulator is "high fidelity" is an immeasurable and meaningless statement. Marine simulators, including Smartship, lack the level of rigor and qualified oversight in terms of the integrity of the systems, models, data and even the qualifications of those running them, in contrast to the requirements that are the mainstay of aviation simulators.

Jim Huggett stated that pilotage has two elements - local knowledge and ship handling skill, this is a concerning oversimplification from a regulator. The skills a pilot develops on the water are significantly more substantial than these two elements and cannot be taught in the artificial environment of a simulator, during daylight hours, with native English-speaking staff and in the absence of a long, rough pilot boat transit/embarkation preceding it. Pilotage is a complex form of risk management involving numerous conflicting elements and the skills involved require exposure and experience onboard ships.

The trainee Marine Pilots employed by Poseidon Sea Pilots are being checked and assessed by persons who do not hold current licenses in the Port of Brisbane and are conducting these assessments in a simulated environment, which is a significant deviation from established world's

AMPI understands that the newly licensed pilots are being licensed under emergency powers, if correct the only emergency here is as a direct result of an incorrectly managed tender and transition process. The apparent deviations from established standards to facilitate the needs of a successful tenderer raises serious questions about the integrity of the process.

Australia has a world leading reputation in marine pilotage, however where there are concerns that these standards are being diminished AMPI must act in the best interests of maintaining the professional integrity of pilotage standards in Australia and the reputation of our members. The developing situation in Brisbane does not comply with essential marine pilot training practices in Australia or internationally.

Please note that we will also be raising awareness of our concerns to relevant stakeholders and industry representatives.

#### Interconnectivity between Organisations

- The pilotage community is relatively small and the change in suppliers for pilotage services in Brisbane has created a great deal of interest nationally.
- The change from a supplier which has held a contract for over 30 years essentially breaks a monopoly situation and creates some nervousness for other long-term pilotage providers.
- The Australasian Marine Pilots Institute (AMPI) has been vocal in its support of BMP and lists the BMP offices in Albion, Brisbane as its Principal Place of Business (Attachment 2). A recent previous AMPI President is the current Managing Director, BMP and two other current BMP pilots are AMPI Directors.

#### BMP QCAT Application

- BMP applied to QCAT for an external review of licences issued to two PSP pilots. It
  also applied for a stay to these licences while the review was being undertaken. The
  result of this application, if granted, would have meant that PSP could not commence
  service delivery until such time as the external review was conducted.
- AMPI's industry communication was used to support this application from BMP.
- The application was dismissed on 22 December 2021.

#### Service Commencement


- PSP started delivery of port pilotage services in Brisbane under contract at 0:30 am on 1 January 2022.
- PSP completed its first movement at 05.48 am. This was the arrival of the SPINNAKER SW (Bulk Carrier, Length overall (LOA) 175.53 metres) to Fisherman Island General Products Berth. This was followed by the TARAGOA arriving at Fisherman Island No 2 Berth roll on roll off vehicle carrier LOA 244.60 metres).
- The previous supplier, Brisbane Marine Pilots Pty Ltd, conducted its final movement finishing at 21.38 pm on 31 December 2021. This was the removal of the STOLT MOMIJI (LOA 121.52m) from Quantem Liquid Terminal to Queensland Bulk Terminal.

#### Training and Licensing

- The tender specifications and contract include the current training and licensing requirements. No change has been made or agreed to be made to these requirements.
- MSQ believes the current training and licensing requirements comply fully with IMO Resolution A960, Annex 1.

#### Port Stakeholders

- Since the BMP statement was released to stakeholders, MSQ has held two industry briefing sessions including one on 3 December 2021, which have addressed misinformation issued from BMP.
- MSQ continued to update stakeholders throughout December 2021 ahead of service delivery commencement under the new contract on 1 January 2022.

Re: Shipping Safety and Environmental Protection is Compromised in the Brisbane Area – Need for Urgent Action

The International Maritime Pilots' Association (IMPA) wrote to you on November 26<sup>th</sup> about an imminent situation that jeopardizes the safety of shipping – including the safe operation of tankers, bulkers, container ships and other commercial vessels – and the protection of the environment in the port of Brisbane, the Brisbane River and the contiguous coastline.

As you know, a change of pilotage service provider is about to take place in the Port of Brisbane and surrounding areas. To worldwide astonishment, this is to be achieved by using persons who have *no* experience as pilots in the Port! Your government proposes to license individuals who may have *never* navigated a commercial vessel into or out of the Port when they start work on the 1st of January, and this approach is being pushed forward even though no prior independent assessment of the risks was conducted.

Furthermore, the approach pushed forward by your government is in total contradiction with both international regulation from the UN Agency responsible for shipping, the international Maritime Organization (IMO), and every international best practice regarding the process for licensing marine pilots.


Internationally ship owners expect Port States to provide services in accordance with IMO requirements and recommendations. In the case of pilotage, this includes graduated hands-on training with licence progression, none of which are visible in the training regime being rolled out now by Marine Safety Queensland.



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In our experience, this situation does not approach anything seen elsewhere in the world and does not meet the standards of adequate policymaking in highly sensitive safety sectors, as is marine pilotage. It follows that the Queensland public has no adequate assurance that safety and environmental protection standards will be maintained after January 1<sup>st</sup>.

The situation can gravely erode public trust in shipping and puts in question the good reputation of Australian marine pilotage. With Brisbane' principal callers all being foreign vessels, we urge you to intervene immediately in this matter to address the risks described above, and at least 'stay' the process until independent oversight and scrutiny can be made of the proposed change. We are at your disposal at any time to discuss this further.

Re: Shipping Safety and Environmental Protection Is Compromised in the Brisbane Area – Need for Urgent Action

I am writing to express grave concerns about a pressing matter that jeopardizes the safety of shipping – including the safe operation of tankers, bulkers, container ships and other commercial vessels – and the protection of the environment in the port of Brisbane, the Brisbane River and the contiguous coastline.

As you may know, considering existing navigational risks, commercial ships transiting the waters mentioned above are required to board marine pilots – highly experienced professionals with specialized knowledge of the local waters who direct the navigation of vessels, independent from shipowners, and with the sole purpose to protect the public interest. The process to become a marine pilot is rigorous and typically requires years of experience in a designated area before a pilot is authorized to conduct the largest vessels. This approach, which is universally followed in all credible, well-organized maritime jurisdictions, ensures a safety record of incident-free assignments that consistently stands at over 99,95%.

A change of pilotage service provider is about to take place in the Port of Brisbane and surrounding areas. To worldwide astonishment, this is to be achieved by using persons who have no experience as pilots in the Port! Your government proposes to license individuals who may have never navigated a commercial vessel into or out of the Port when they start work on the 1st of January, and this approach is being pushed forward even though no prior independent assessment of the risks was conducted.

Furthermore, the approach pushed forward by your government is in total contradiction with both international regulation from the UN Agency responsible for shipping, the International Maritime Organization, and every international best practice regarding the process for licensing marine pilots.



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In our experience, this situation does not meet the standards of adequate policymaking in highly sensitive safety sectors, as is marine pilotage, and it follows that the Queensland public currently has no adequate assurance that safety and environmental protection standards will be maintained.

I have written to your Transport Minister last month about this matter, without result. I am deeply concerned by this situation, which can significantly erode public trust in shipping, and puts in question the good reputation of Australian marine pilotage.

As the representative of Australian marine pilots at the International Maritime Organization, the International Maritime Pilots' Association urges you to intervene immediately in this matter to address the risks described above, and we are at your disposal at any time to discuss this further.

## IMPORTANT MESSAGE TO THE SHIPPING AND LOGISTICS INDUSTRY

For 32 years, Brisbane Marine Pilots (BMP) has been proudly servicing the Port of Brisbane's marine pilotage needs.

On and from 1 January 2022, that is scheduled to end.

You have always been able to count on BMP pilots to ensure safe and efficient supply chains in the Port of Brisbane. However, from 1 January 2022, a company which has never piloted a ship before will be responsible for piloting your vessels. BMP considers that, in these circumstances, shipowners / operators and terminal operators must inform themselves, well before that date, of any risks which may arise from this major change and satisfy themselves that they are adequately mitigating those risks.

A potential source of major risk is pilot training. Maritime Safety Queensland's (MSQ) current proven, approved training requirements are consistent with all other major Australian ports. Next year you will receive a pilotage experience through a training methodology as yet untested in any maritime market.

Over the last week there has been some disinformation circulated regarding the provision of pilotage services in the Port of Brisbane in 2022.

BMP wish to state categorically that we have not at all been involved in any transfer of pilotage knowledge and experience to the new service provider. In fact, prior to Andrew Mahon's recent appointment as the Acting General Manager of MSQ, there had been no substantive engagement with BMP regarding the provision or transfer of knowledge to any future pilotage service.

Port-specific knowledge is the foundation of marine pilotage. It keeps port costs low, through limiting delays, ensuring continuity of service, the efficient use of other services such as towage, as well as mitigating the risk of marine incidents for shippers and the wider port community. That was always BMP's service guarantee to you.

What you get from 1 January 2022, as far as we know, is a pilot with only Port of Brisbane simulator training, observation on tugs, on lines boats and on the dredge "Brisbane" (LOA 84.1m). In our view, this is not a robust training plan, but an untested departure from an Australia-wide accepted pilotage practice in one of Australia's most difficult ports.

No doubt you are all aware that under section 102 of the Transport Operations Marine Safety Act 1994 (QLD) the ship owner and Master are generally liable for damage and loss regardless of the pilot conducting the pilotage. Therefore, from 1 January 2022 the increased risk resulting from this deviation of pilot training and licencing standards and the absence of knowledge-transfer, falls directly on the vessel Master and owner/operator. BMP is proud of its proven record in protecting the ship owners and Masters from this liability.

Despite BMP's best efforts to re-secure the contract, after 31 December 2021, the current collective knowledge and experience of pilots will no longer serve Brisbane. Whilst extremely disappointed with this outcome, BMP has partnered with Australia's largest pilot and port services provider, Auriga Group to ensure our pilots can maintain their professional standards in a company which has actual pilotage experience.

We believe the question for you as the terminal or shipowner/operator, is "Have I been supplied with enough information from MSQ to be satisfied that the radical changes which MSQ is implementing for the provision of pilotage on and from I January 2022 will not place my terminal or vessel at undue risk?" BMP considers that as a minimum, shipowners/operators would wish to have all details of the new training plan so that they can compare it with the current tried and tested plan, as well as with the pilot training requirements in other ports with which you are familiar.


I am advised by Maritime Safety Queensland (MSQ), Department of Transport and Main Roads, that there has been no change to the legislation governing licensing for port pilots in Queensland, or to the associated policies. MSQ prides itself on its progressive approach to safety regulation. Licensing requirements are constantly under review as changes to port environs, ship types and dimensions, shipping volumes and new technology dictate.

MSQ assures me that it considers that its training, certification and licensing arrangements for all Queensland pilotage areas, including the Brisbane pilotage area, comply with IMO Resolution A960 Annex 1.

I am also advised that the change in service providers for pilotage services in the Brisbane pilotage area was through a competitive tender process and rigorous assessment of tender submissions.

The new service provider commenced service delivery under the contract on 1 January 2022, and despite extreme weather conditions arising from ex-Tropical Cyclone Seth, a smooth transition has been achieved.

I trust this information is of assistance.
