Welcome to the 3rd edition of Main Roads Emerald newsletter!

Safety will be a primary focus for 2009 as Main Roads prepares to roll out a number of road improvement projects in Emerald.

The stand-out project this year will be the start of installation works for Emerald's first set of traffic lights at the Ruby and Egerton streets intersection.

Other works underway in Emerald include the completion of an \$8.7 million rehabilitation of the Peak Downs Highway near Myall Creek; start of construction of a \$6.7 million upgrade of the Dawson Highway at Meteor Creek; and the implementation of various safety enhancements to the Capricorn Highway, including new linemarking and signage.

These projects will help enhance the safety of motorists travelling throughout the Emerald District.

While works are occurring, urge motorists to slow down and drive to the changed conditions. Speed restrictions will be in place around many of the worksites and it is vital that all road users drive to the changed conditions to ensure the safety of themselves and our roadworkers.

We are working closely with the Queensland Police to enforce speed restrictions around roadworks and minimise delays for motorists.

In light of the recent Queensland Election, Premier Anna Bligh announced that Queensland Transport and the Department of Main Roads will merge to form a single agency to be known as the Department of Transport and Main Roads. The merge of these portfolios is part of a whole of government initiative instituted by the Premier to consolidate like functions into larger and more viable agency groupings.

In closing, the Emerald and Rockhampton offices are continuing to work closely to deliver quality roadworks in the Fitzroy Region.

- » listen for radio updates

Safer Roads for the Central Highlands

Main Roads has allocated more than \$1 billion over five years to direct safety initiatives, This includes the \$54m Safer Roads sooner program, which is funding the installation of traffic lights at the intersection of Egerton Street and Ruby Street.

Emerald had grown significantly in the past five years and installing the traffic lights will help improve safety of road users, maintain local access to businesses and provide safe pedestrian crossings.

Main Roads will commence construction of the new lights towards the end of 2009 and they are expected to be fully functional by mid 2010.

Keep an eye out for Main Roads in local shopping centres as community consultation kicks off very shortly!

I am a Civil Engineer working for various projects with the Program Delivery and Development team.



The floods - one year on

Since the January flood event last year, funding from the Natural Disaster Relief and Recovery Arrangement has been approved and repair works have commenced.

Approximately \$13.7m worth of roadworks will be carried out in the Central Highlands and so far, all projects are on schedule. Some of the projects include repairing failures on the pavement and clearing culverts.

Main Roads would like to thank the travelling public for their patience while we carry out these important roadworks.



Meteor Creek, Dawson Highway

Construction of the \$8.5 million Meteor Creek Project on the Dawson Highway south of Rolleston commenced on Monday 2 March 2009.

The project will improve the pavement structure on a 17km stretch of the Dawson Highway and provide motorists with a safer and smoother ride.

The Dawson Highway is a State Strategic Road and connects Emerald with Gladstone to the east and Roma to the south, providing an important freight and tourism route through the central mid west region.

The contract for the Meteor Creek project was awarded to JMS Civil and Mining on 17 February 2009, who have since commenced construction on site.

Motorists are encouraged to remain patient, observe roadworks signs and always drive to the conditions. Traffic control will be in place for the duration of the project, which is expected to take 6 months, weather permitting.

Myall Creek, Peak Downs Highway

An \$8.75 million upgrade to the Peak Downs Highway at Myall Creek, approximately 22km north-east of Clermont is well underway and is due for completion in mid 2009, weather permitting.

The rehabilitation and widening project will improve the pavement structure and provide an 8.5 metre sealed road on an 8.1km section of the Peak Downs Highway at Myall Creek.

RoadTek has been engaged to deliver the project and it is important while construction is in place that drivers play their part in ensuring a safe construction site by slowing down and following the instructions of traffic controllers and signage. Main Roads thanks motorists for their patience during these important works and will aim to minimise disruptions as much as possible.

Clermont Coal

» The Clermont Coal Road Deviation Project started in the field on 14 September 2007.

This project will provide Main Roads and the Central Queensland community with approximately 15 km of newly constructed road to replace approximately 11.5 km of old road of variable condition. This constitutes an investment into the District's road asset of at least \$23m.

The project is due for completion in mid 2009, weather permitting.



Towards our targets

Keeping the lines of communication open was vital when the Main Roads Emerald Office started work on the \$5.3 million Hospital Road Rehabilitation Project. The road is the principal arterial through the Central Queensland town and is the chosen transport route for many of the region's primary industries.

The project was completed in late 2008 and was carried out in order to maintain the safety of the travelling public and improve the condition of the road. As a result of industry growth, traffic volumes in Emerald had increased significantly over recent years which had put greater demands on the performance requirements of Hospital Road.

Sheila O'Keefe, Main Roads Assistant Operational Manager, praised the efforts of her fellow team members.

"We had a great team, everyone worked well together and it was a great learning experience."

The stakeholders along Hospital Road provided fantastic feedback about the work and the consultation process.

Queensland Police Service Senior Sergeant Graeme Reeves, said the community received excellent communication from the project team.

"Consultation was excellent by both the administrative level and road works supervisors. Emergency services were kept informed at all times."

The Hospital Road Rehabilitation Project proved a great success coming in under budget by \$700,000 and being delivered within the negotiated timeframes.
