

Code of conduct

When using the rail trail, respect other users, the natural environment and the privacy of adjacent landholders.

Sharing

- Please leave gates as found
- Do not obstruct the trail
- **Cyclists:** alert other users of their approach and pass at a reduced speed
- Approach horses with care
- Do not feed or approach animals in adjacent paddocks
- Park in designated areas
- Observe local signs and regulations
- **Keep dogs under control and on a lead.**

Environment

- Keep on the rail trail
- Do not interfere with native plants or animals
- **Take your rubbish home with you**
- Clean up after your dog
- Do not light fires
- Clean bikes, walking boots and other equipment after your trip to minimise the spread of plant and animal pests and diseases.

For your safety and comfort

- Be cautious at all road and creek crossings
- **Cyclists and horse riders must dismount at road crossings**
- Cyclists and horse riders must wear an approved helmet and ride in control
- Do not approach pets or livestock in adjacent properties
- Carry drinking water and light snacks
- Wear appropriate clothing for the conditions
- Maintain your equipment, and carry repair and first aid kits in case of emergencies
- **Where possible, don't travel by yourself**
- **Let a responsible person know where you are going and when you expect to return before you go.**

Trail Summary

Location

The Moore to Linville section of the Brisbane Valley Rail Trail is located in the upper reaches of the Brisbane River valley, 44 km north of Esk in south east Queensland. It can be reached in less than 2 hours with an easy drive by car or bus through the countryside from Brisbane (via the Bruce and D'Aguilar Highways or the Brisbane Valley and D'Aguilar Highways).

Environment

Daytime temperatures can reach over 35 degrees in summer.

Features of the environment include:

- river flats, slightly undulating plains and low hills of the Brisbane River valley
- selectively cleared grazing lands
- remnant Forest Red Gums (*Eucalyptus tereticornis*) in paddocks
- pockets of riverine scrub at Greenhide Creek (including rock figs)
- woodland birds
- upper reaches of the Brisbane River can be viewed from the trail (watch for gliding birds of prey).

Distance

From Moore to Linville Station is 7km. The next section of the trail extends 23 kms up the old rail line from Linville to Benarkin and Blackbutt.

Slopes

Mostly flat to gently sloping, but crossings at Boundary and Greenhide Creeks are moderately steep (up to 20%) up to 40 metres in length.

Sites of interest

Moore Memorial Hall, Moore School, Moore Cemetery, Greenhide Scrub, Linville Station, Linville Pub.

Uses

Walking, cycling and horse riding only. Trail surface is gravel and unsuitable for road bicycles or personal mobility vehicles. No motorised vehicles of any type are allowed. Horse drawn vehicles by prior arrangement only.

Surface

Compacted gravel and concrete creek crossings.
