\$5 million to improve driving conditions on Brisbane–Woodford Road

- A smoother drive ahead for motorists on Dayboro Road.
- \$5 million is being invested by the Queensland Government in asphalt resurfacing between Kurwongbah and Whiteside.
- The project is being delivered under the Road Asset Management Contract (RAMC), supporting the state-controlled road network.

Asphalt resurfacing works will soon begin on a 3.5km section of Brisbane–Woodford Road, locally known as Dayboro Road, between Kurwongbah and Whiteside.

The Queensland Government has invested \$5 million in the project, which is being delivered under the Road Asset Management Contract (RAMC), supporting the state-controlled road network.

The resurfacing will extend pavement life, improve surface quality, and reduce ongoing maintenance costs. Motorists will benefit from smoother and safer driving conditions along this key corridor.

Works are scheduled to commence in mid-August 2025 and are expected to take approximately six weeks to complete, weather and construction conditions permitting.

Delays and increased travel times may occur during construction. Works will be carried out Sunday to Thursday, between 6pm and 6am, with occasional day and weekend works as required. Traffic controllers will be on site to assist motorists through the work zone.

Reduced speed limits, road signage, and variable message signs will be in place to advise of changed traffic conditions and ensure the safety of both motorists and road workers.

“Resurfacing projects continue to play a key role in maintaining our road network to the highest possible standard to cater for future growth.

“Brisbane–Woodford Road is a key connector linking Brisbane to townships such as Dayboro, Mount Mee, and Woodford.

“This route is popular with tourists, day trippers, and motorbike riders.

“TMR invests in regional connectors like Brisbane–Woodford Road to ensure smoother, safer driving conditions for the 4,800 vehicles that use this route daily.

“Resurfacing and rehabilitation projects are vital to supporting local communities and facilitating safe travel.

“This work follows recent pavement stabilisation and resealing along 37km of Brisbane–Woodford Road between Mount Mee and Whiteside.”
