Safer, smoother ride on the way for North Brisbane motorists

- \$14 million improvement on the way for Anzac Avenue through Kallangur.
- Rehabilitation and resurfacing works are expected to commence late August to early September.
- The project will provide road users with a safer, smoother journey.

Work will start in coming weeks to deliver a \$14 million upgrade to Anzac Avenue (Redcliffe Road) in Kallangur and three adjoining Bruce Highway entry and exit ramps.

The project will deliver safer, smoother driving conditions along three kilometres of road from School Road to west of North Lakes Drive, improving the journey for over 48,000 motorists who use the route daily.

Additionally, the bridge over the Bruce Highway will be resurfaced and further pavement rehabilitation will take place on the highway's northbound entry and exit ramps, and the southbound exit ramp, at Exit 133.

Key works include:

- removing and replacing the existing asphalt surface and underlying pavement layers
- reinstating pavement and surfacing layers
- line marking, including changes to improve bike rider safety.

The road surface and underlying pavement improvement will help extend the road's lifespan and reduce ongoing maintenance costs.

Works are expected to be completed in five months, weather and construction conditions permitting.

Given the high traffic volumes on Anzac Avenue, works will be undertaken at night (6pm–6am, Sunday to Thursday), with occasional weekend works as required.

The Department of Transport and Main Roads will engage with affected residents and businesses before construction begins to minimise disruptions.

Quotes attributable to Transport and Main Roads Acting Regional Director, North Coast Region, Melanie Dei Rossi:

"Anzac Avenue is a critical link in Queensland's state-controlled road network, connecting the Bruce Highway to communities like Petrie, Kallangur, Mango Hill, Rothwell, Kippa-Ring, and Redcliffe.

"Rehabilitating key arterial roads like Anzac Avenue is essential for extending the life of the road and ensuring a safer journey for all road users.

"We're pleased to deliver this upgraded road surface for the 48,000 motorists who travel this stretch of Anzac Avenue daily, as well as for bike riders and pedestrians.

"Every effort will be made to minimise disruptions and noise during construction, but we acknowledge there will be temporary inconveniences for residents and businesses. We thank the community for their patience and cooperation as we complete these important works."
